#### SEXTORTION – The hidden pandemic Documentary film & discussion

"Sextortion" documentary is an expose into the world of online grooming and sextortion of children- an increasingly growing threat in today's digitally connected world. By unsealing the HSI case of a top gun pilot with hundreds of victims, and interviewing victims and their parents, this true-crime piece opens the eyes of viewers as to how this atrocious crime is becoming wide-spread.

Participants will be able to:

- Define sextortion
- Explain common tactics and threats used by extorters
- Learn how to avoid being sextorted online
- Outline options available to victims of sextortion

An insider look into one of the largest sextortion cases investigated by Homeland Security and DOJ on American soil, as various experts, parents and victims sound the alarm on the fastest growing cybercrime against children ever.

## Why Positive & Adverse Experiences Matter (PACEs)

Childhood trauma is the result of an event or a series of events which cause a child to feel helpless and pushed beyond their ability to cope. Trauma affects children differently depending on their age, personality, and past experiences. When a child is traumatized, it affects the whole child: their mind, body, spirit, and relationships with others.

- Understand the impact of Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs), trauma, and toxic stress on health, behavior, learning, the economy, and our community
- Share protective factors that help to prevent ACEs

# DARKNESS TO LIGHT ~ STEWARDS OF CHILDREN Sexual abuse prevention training

Darkness to Light's Stewards of Children® provides actionable behaviors that create prevention-oriented communities. Participants will exit the training being able to engage in conversations about child sexual abuse prevention with other adults and enact prevention policies where children live, learn, and play. They will also be able to recognize and react to boundary violations as well as suspected child abuse and disclosures. Participants will transfer the skills they learn into their communities, helping to embed prevention practices into their communities and help embed prevention practices within their spheres of influence to help proactively prevent child sexual abuse.

Learning objectives include:

- Recognize the power and impact you have within your sphere of influence
- Distinguish between the myths and facts of child sexual abuse
- Examine ways to minimize opportunities for abuse in a variety of situations including online and gaming environments
- Discuss strategies to bridge cultural gaps that may potentially inhibit open communication

#### TIME FOR YOUR TEEN

Time for Your Teen is workshop designed to equip parents, caregivers, and youth development professionals with the knowledge and tools to foster open, honest, and meaningful conversations about sex and sexuality with the youth in their care. Participants will explore topics such as family values, communication strategies, adolescent development, sexual health resources, and how to initiate sex-positive discussions.

Participants will develop their skills in and understanding of:

- opening lines of communication with their child
- utilizing teachable moments
- new ways of communicating
- listening when discussing sensitive topics
- getting past roadblocks in talking about sex; and
- helping youth make decisions about abstinence, contraception, and overall healthy relationships (romantic, peer, and trusted adults)

#### THE COMPLEX INTRICACIES OF THE NARCISSIST AND THEIR VICTIMS

The topic of narcissism is all too common anywhere one may look on social media. Unfortunately, there is a lot of misinformation that is currently being presented that may be harmful to social media consumers.

There is not a "one size fits all" description of a narcissist, which adds to the complexity of understanding this topic.

This presentation will provide a deeper understanding of the characteristics and traits of a narcissist, and the effects they have on the lives of others.

- Learn the different types of narcissism & defining characteristics of narcissistic behavior
- Define and explain trauma bonding
- Identify traits victims of narcissistic abuse display
- Learn 3 ways to heal from narcissistic abuse

## **HARM REDUCTION - Strategies for Youth**

Understanding harm reduction is a strategy to reduce risks and increase protective factors. Adolescence is a time of experimentation and risk-taking behaviors. Some of these behaviors are coping mechanisms resulting from trauma and abuse, leading to addiction and long-term consequences. Once engaged in these behaviors, such as substance misuse, high risk sexual behavior, or self-harm, abstaining can be difficult or rejected by youth.

The premise of harm reduction is to reduce the risks associated with these behaviors, while increasing protective factors such as alternate coping skills, social engagement, and supportive family interaction.

Learn how harm reduction can be an effective tool to reduce or minimize consequences of negative or risky behaviors.
